Professor Taylor always emphasized the relevance of the past to the present and encouraged us to critically examine ideas we take for granted. His examinations of past and present American scandals reveal much about American culture over time and how our press operates.

An understanding of American cultural values across history, an understanding of story telling techniques and the ways in which those shape our perception of history, an appreciation for the changing media landscape of the United States and the ways in which that interacts with values to create scandal

How scandals have evolved; how media has evolved; podcasting skills





VERY GOOD LECTURER!! Seriously the lectures were so much fun!




very clearly cared about course material and students




