Reflection

Q 1: What would you say are the top two or three things (ideas, skills, perspectives, etc.) you personally gained from this course?

Comments

This course provided me with an entirely new perspective on the American Revolution. The different motivations that led up to the start of the Revolution was one one of the biggest set of ideas that I took away from this course, as it contradicts most of what is traditionally perceived as the motivations for the American Revolution. In fact, much of what I had previously known about the Revolution turned out to be mythologies, which was both disheartening and intriguing.

Learned about misconceptions surrounding the American Revolution, which added to my previous knowledge about it

I learned about conflicting ideologies during the American Revolution and how ordinary people enacted change.

One of the main perspectives I learned was looking at the American Revolution through the lens of the people that didn't actually create the founding documents. We looked closely figures and events in the revolution other than the 'founding fathers,' which taught us how to study alternate histories from those that are usually taught. We also gained skills in reading, analyzing, and contextualizing primary sources.

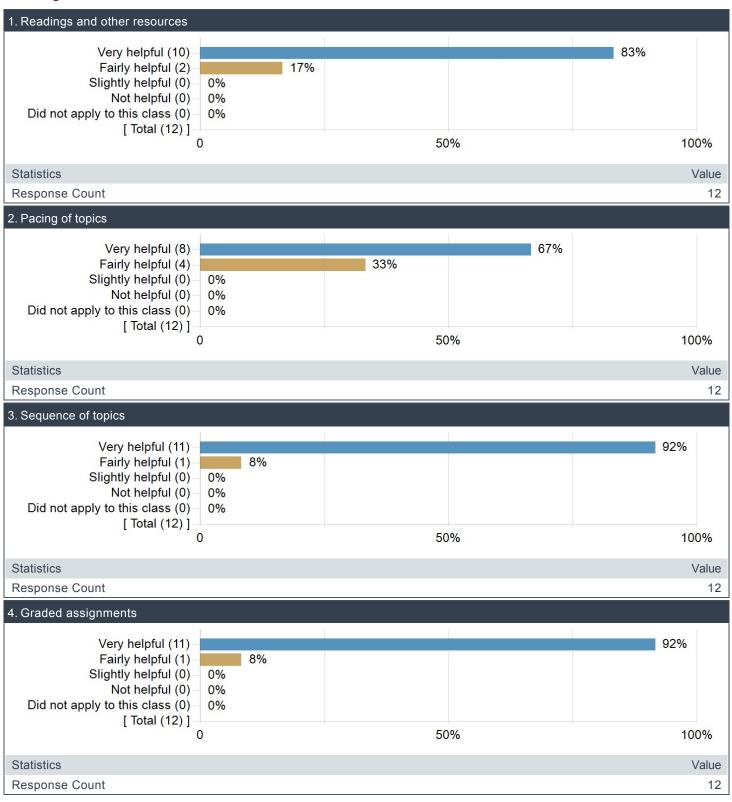

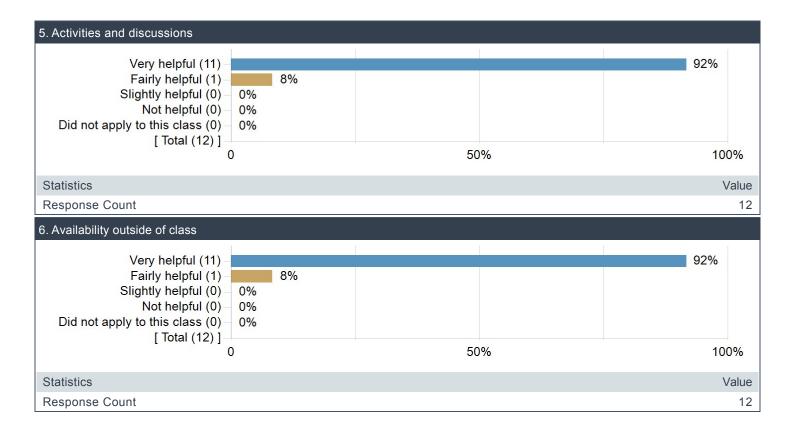
Professor Taylor is such a kind and understanding teacher, as well as being great at teaching. His recorded lectures included some eyeroll—worthy memes but were very fun to watch.

I know that there was a lot of material to get through, so I understand why the class needed to be paced the way that it was. That being said, I am a bit of a slow reader especially when it comes to academic or historical texts, so it often took me a lot longer to read the material for this class.

The primary sources we read were always really helpful and interesting to read, whether they were diaries or pension applications. I know that the government side to the class was very important, but sometimes the readings and discussions were dry and difficult to follow. Both books we read were pretty long considering how quickly we moved on from them, and we didn't usually get to all of the points in class, so it was sometimes a little frustrating to read 100+ pages a week.

I like that we went through the actual Revolution talking more about broad ideas than specific battles. It made the course feel like there were themes running through it, which came through in our discussions.

I liked watching the lectures on my own time. It made the class more interesting since listening to professors talk for half the class can get boring at times.

I loved both of the books we read, especially Independence Lost, and I really liked doing the primary source assignment

I liked the format of using Perusall because it offered a different way to participate and also a way to ask questions about the readings and get answers.

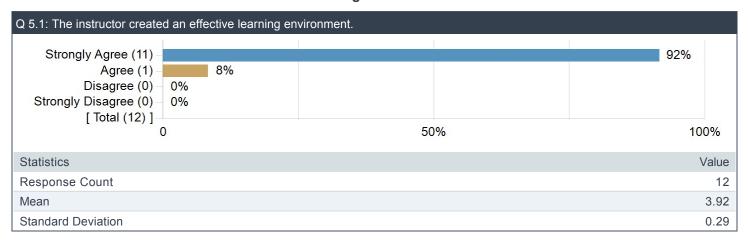

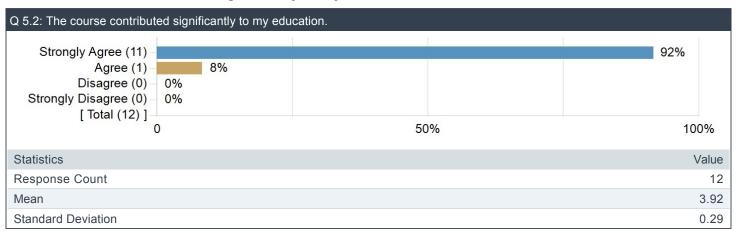
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Effective Learning and Contribution to Education
